
Just like the Medicine Miracles, you are a superhero for being so brave and the doctor will have your powers restored in no time!




> It's time to kiss my parents goodbye and give them a big hug before I go off to sleep

> It's time to go to sleep now. We'll see you when it is time to wake up!




Connect the dots!
